Session 1: Homeopathic case analysis

We will explore the works of J Ellis Barker, who practiced polypharmacy (get out the garlic all you classical homoeopaths!). His work is very interesting and his bedside manner was incredible and his cases and cures fantastic.

Even if you never intend to use polypharmacy then a knowledge of it is still useful so that you may make an informed opinion. As a wise man once said "you can't judge nothing you don't understand".

Session 2: Body Language and case taking.

A very quick look at human evolution which attempts to explain why we do what we do with our bodies. Body language is estimated to be responsible for 60-90% of our communication interactions. This is a great skill to use with case taking. Materia medica examples of keynote body language indications.

Session 3: Pregnancy food cravings and aversions and the indicated remedy

Some of the most strange, rare and downright peculiar symptoms we encounter in clinic come as the weird things that expectant mums want to eat! These may be great guiding symptoms for the mum and at times good indications for the future remedies for the child. Lots of case examples and please send your own experiences and story about this subject.

Also lots of therapeutics involving small remedy materia medica.

Session 4: Evidence!

How to communicate with sceptics of homoeopathy. Arm your selves with shields and swords and let's have a bash at the members of the public that have their views about homoeopathy formed by the media.

The media and a few vocal scientists make claims about homoeopathy that are poorly researched and that cherry pick research papers that support their views. They ignore papers and research that support homoeopathy. THIS IS NOT GOOD SCIENCE! Luckily I'm a geek with a few science degrees and can show you three areas of research that you can share with the sceptics.
